Commencement Information

To Our Guests

Commencement, the solemn but joyful climax and recognition of the graduates' years of study, is an important occasion to the University, its faculty, staff, and students. All guests and participants are requested to avoid unnecessary conversation or moving about during the exercises.

Professional photos will be taken of each graduate with the chancellor and after exiting the stage. When the processional party enters at the beginning of the ceremony, the audience rises. They remain standing until all members of the platform party have taken their places on the platform.

Following the chancellor's closing remarks, there is a recessional. The audience is requested to remain at their seats during this period.

We welcome you to the fifty-second annual commencement exercises for associate and baccalaureate degree candidates at Penn State Hazleton.

Academic Procession

The medallion worn by Chancellor Gary M. Lawler during the ceremony was instituted by the University in 1971. Symbolizing the authority to confer degrees, the bronze medallion is two and three quarters inches in diameter with the

founding date of the University on one side and the founding date of the Hazleton campus on the other side.

The mace carried by the Faculty Marshall is inscribed to honor the memory of Marlene Guers who served the campus for nearly thirty years in a range of positions including senior instructor in mathematics, coordinator of the honors program, and assistant director of Academic Affairs.

In academic commencement ceremonies, the mace is the symbolic extension of the chancellor. Most often carried in a commencement ceremony at the head of the marchers or immediately ahead of the chancellor, the mace serves as the object vested with the power of the institution.

Academic Dress

Academic regalia originated in medieval monasteries to distinguish persons such as doctors, masters, and bachelors from the general population. In about 1895, American colleges and universities adopted the uniform code of academic dress that is used today.

Caps

The traditional cap in the United States for all degrees is a black mortar board. The tassel is usually black, but the doctor's cap may have a gold tassel.

Gowns

The design of the traditional academic black gown signifies the degree held. The bachelor's gown has pointed sleeves, while the master's gown has oblong sleeves that are open at the wrists. The doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves with three velvet chevrons.

Hoods

Hoods are usually not worn by recipients of the bachelor's degree. The master's hood is three-and-a-half feet long and the doctor's hood is four feet long. The linings of the hoods are in official colors of the university conferring the degree. The velvet hood trim indicates the subject of the degree. Some colors associated with the disciplines include: arts, letter, and humanities – white; business – drab; economics – copper; education – light blue; engineering – orange; fine arts – brown; journalism – crimson; music – pink; speech – silver; philosophy – dark blue; physical education – sage green; science – golden yellow; and social work – citron.

Cords

An honor cord provides an outward sign that these particular students have excelled in the classroom or have served or are serving our nation with pride.

Academic honor cords recognize the top 12 percent of degree candidates in each college and at every campus. Students who are graduating Summa Cum Laude are wearing a blue and white cord, students who are graduating Magna Cum Laude are wearing a blue cord, and students who are graduating Cum Laude are wearing a white cord.

Adult students excelling in the classroom while facing competing interests of home and work are recognized with membership into Alpha Sigma Lambda honor society. Members of Alpha Sigma Lambda are wearing a burgundy and gold cord.

Students who have honorably served, are serving, or are commissioned to serve in the U.S. military will be awarded an honor cord in recognition of their duty and sacrifice. The red, white and blue

cords will be given to eligible graduating students in the following groups: active duty, reserve and National Guard service members; veterans; and graduates receiving a commission through Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) and official U.S. Armed Forces recruiting programs.

About Our Commencement Speaker

Gary M. Lawler

Penn State Hazleton Chancellor

Gary M. Lawler was named chancellor of Penn State Hazleton in July 2007. On June 30, 2022, he will retire after 15 years of service to Penn State.

He has been an active member of numerous committees since joining Penn State, including Faculty Rights and Responsibilities, Campus Engagement in India, the Commission for Adult Learners, the Prior Learning Assessment Committee, the University-wide Academic Infrastructure and Support working group, and the planning committee for the University's current fundraising campaign, "A Greater Penn State for 21st Century Excellence."



His numerous accomplishments at the campus include increased programming, the formation of an enrollment management team, a comprehensive strategic plan, increased diversity, and campus beautification.

Lawler has overseen many initiatives that have helped to provide an improved student experience focused on individualized attention and mentoring, including a \$7.6 million renewal project on the Mary M. and Bertil E. Lofstrom Library completed in 2020 and a \$15.5 million renovation of the Kostos Building completed in 2017.

Lawler also led the efforts to revitalize the Slusser/Bayzick Building, which included the creation of the Black Box Theatre, a multifunctional space for performances and learning, and dedicated classrooms and laboratories for students in health care programs offered by the Office of Continuing Education (CE). Additional campus infrastructure and beautification initiatives include the Barbara J. and Ronald L. Balasco Sr. Bella Vista, Dr. Lil Junas Garden, and an extensive roadway project.

In addition to growth and improvements in the physical plant, the number of four-year baccalaureate degrees increased from five to 13, and a wide range of student-centered initiatives related to retention, student success, and diversity, equity and inclusion were instituted. He was also involved in articulation agreements with three area community colleges and the Vidyalankar School of Information Technology, Mumbai, India, which allow students to seamlessly transition from their starting institution program into a Penn State baccalaureate degree program at many campuses.

Lawler also helped to establish practical nursing as an anchor program for the campus' CE office. Since the program launched in 2010, it has graduated more than 250 students and spurred the development of additional health care education programs offered through CE.

During his tenure, support for students through scholarships, awards, program endowments and special funds has doubled, allowing the campus to provide funding to twice as many students seeking to earn a Penn State degree.

Additionally, he contributed to the effort to revitalize downtown Hazleton by leading and partnering with several community organizations to develop the Hazleton LaunchBox supported by Pasco L. Schiavo Esq., which opened in downtown Hazleton in Sept. 2019. In April 2019, the Hazleton LaunchBox was the third innovation hub in the University to be endowed and named for a benefactor after the campus received a gift of \$1 million from the estate of longtime supporter and philanthropist Pasco L. Schiavo.

Lawler has also worked on town and gown relationships in the Hazleton community through his service to the Greater Hazleton Chamber of Commerce, CAN DO economic development organization, Alice C. Wiltsie Performing Arts Center, Hazleton Area Public Library, Downtown Hazleton Alliance for Progress, Partners in Education and Rotary, just to name a few. In June 2018, he was recognized by the Concerned Parents of Hazleton Area for his guidance, dedication, and advocacy when he received the group's Humanitarian Award during their tenth anniversary celebration.

Lawler began his academic career teaching mathematics at Adirondack Community College in Queensbury, New York, where he ultimately earned the rank of full professor. His teaching career at Adirondack lasted 23 years until he was named assistant to the vice president of academic affairs. In 2001, he became academic dean at the College of St. Joseph, Rutland, Vermont, and in 2004 was named vice president of academic and student affairs.

Lawler earned an associate degree in mathematics/science from Adirondack Community College and a bachelor's degree with a double major in mathematics and theater from the State University of New York College at Brockport. He also holds a master's degree in mathematics and a doctorate in curriculum and instruction from the University at Albany.

Academic Awards

3. to the full-time Penn State Hazleton associate degree student with the highest grade-point average in Penn State course work who intends to graduate.

The Kostos Award consists of a cash award and a replica of the Nittany Lion.
